# For-the-Birds Feeder

## What You Need:

- Sharpened pencil
- Sugar ice cream cone
- Pipe cleaner
- Table knife
- Creamy peanut butter
- Cheerios™ cereal
- Birdseed



## How To Make:

### Step 1

- Use the pencil to poke a hole in the pointed end of the ice cream cone.

### Step 2

- Twist a knot in the end of the pipe cleaner. Thread the pipe cleaner into the ice cream cone and out the hole (the knot will hold the pipe cleaner in place).

### Step 3

- Use the table knife to spread the peanut butter on the outside of the cone. Press the cereal all over the peanut butter to cover the cone. Sprinkle the birdseed over the cone, pressing it into the peanut butter with your fingers.

# PEANUT BUTTER DOG TREATS



## Ingredients:

- 3 cups old-fashioned oats
- 1 banana
- 1/3 cup peanut butter (choose variety with NO Zylitol)
- 1 egg
- 2 tbsp. flour, if necessary
- \* 1 - 2 tbsp. water, if needed

## Instructions:

1. Preheat oven to 350°F (176°C). Line baking sheet with parchment paper or silpat, set aside.
2. Add oats to the bowl of a food processor.
3. Let machine run for 2 - 3 minutes, until oats are almost flour consistency with a few big pieces left.
4. Add peanut butter, banana and egg to food processor.
5. Mix until dough looks uniform. *\*If dough seems a bit dry, add a tablespoon or two of water and blend until desired consistency.*
6. Turn the dough out onto the countertop.
7. If the dough is too sticky to work with - sprinkle the countertop with a tablespoon or two of flour, and work some of the flour from the counter into the dough until it is no longer sticky.
8. Roll the dough out to roughly 1/8" thick.
9. Cut treats out with cookie cutter and place on baking sheet. Bake for 16 - 18 minutes, rotate trays halfway through.
10. Cool completely before giving to your dog.

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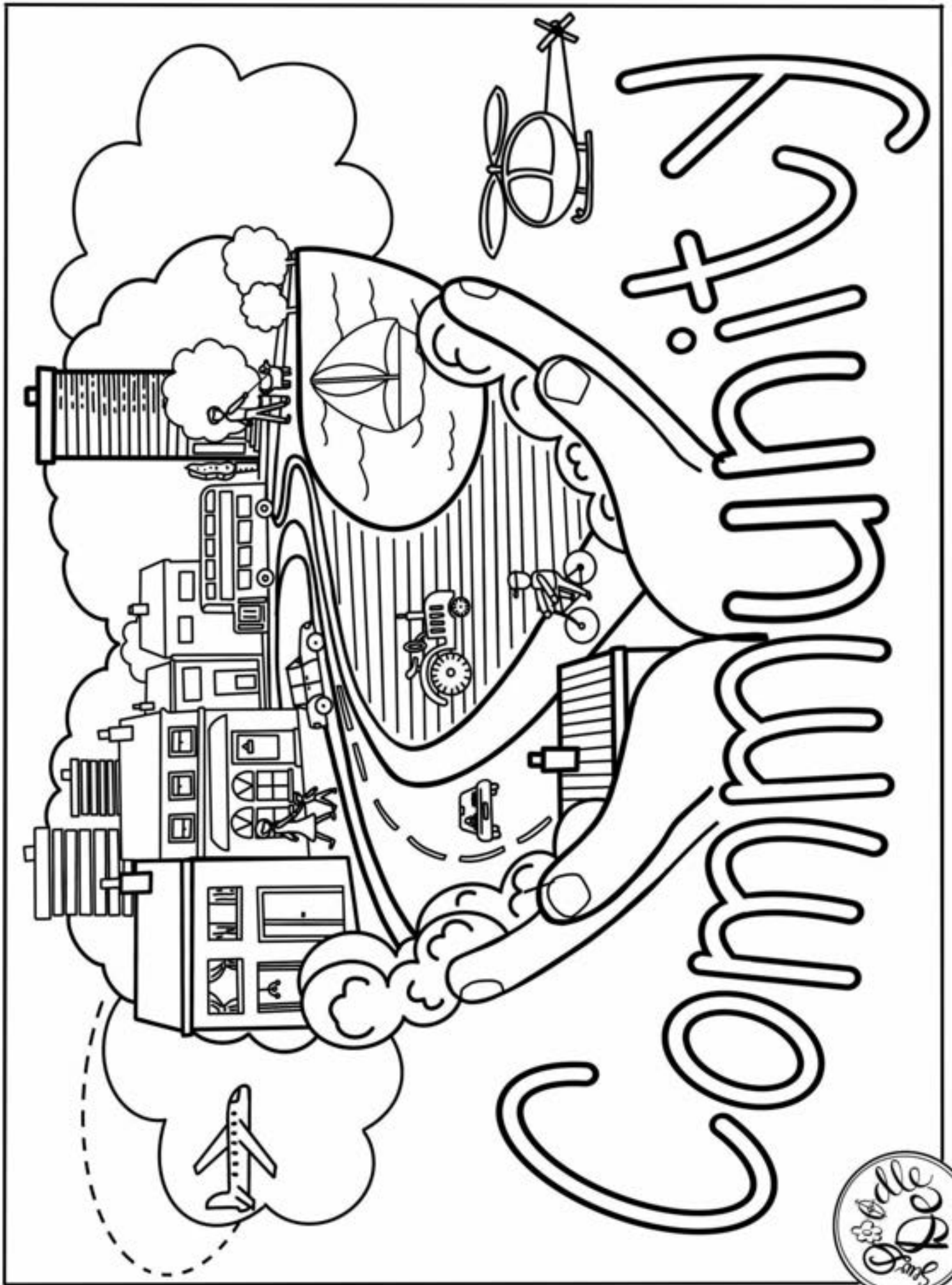

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# ORIGAMI HEART CORNER BOOKMARK



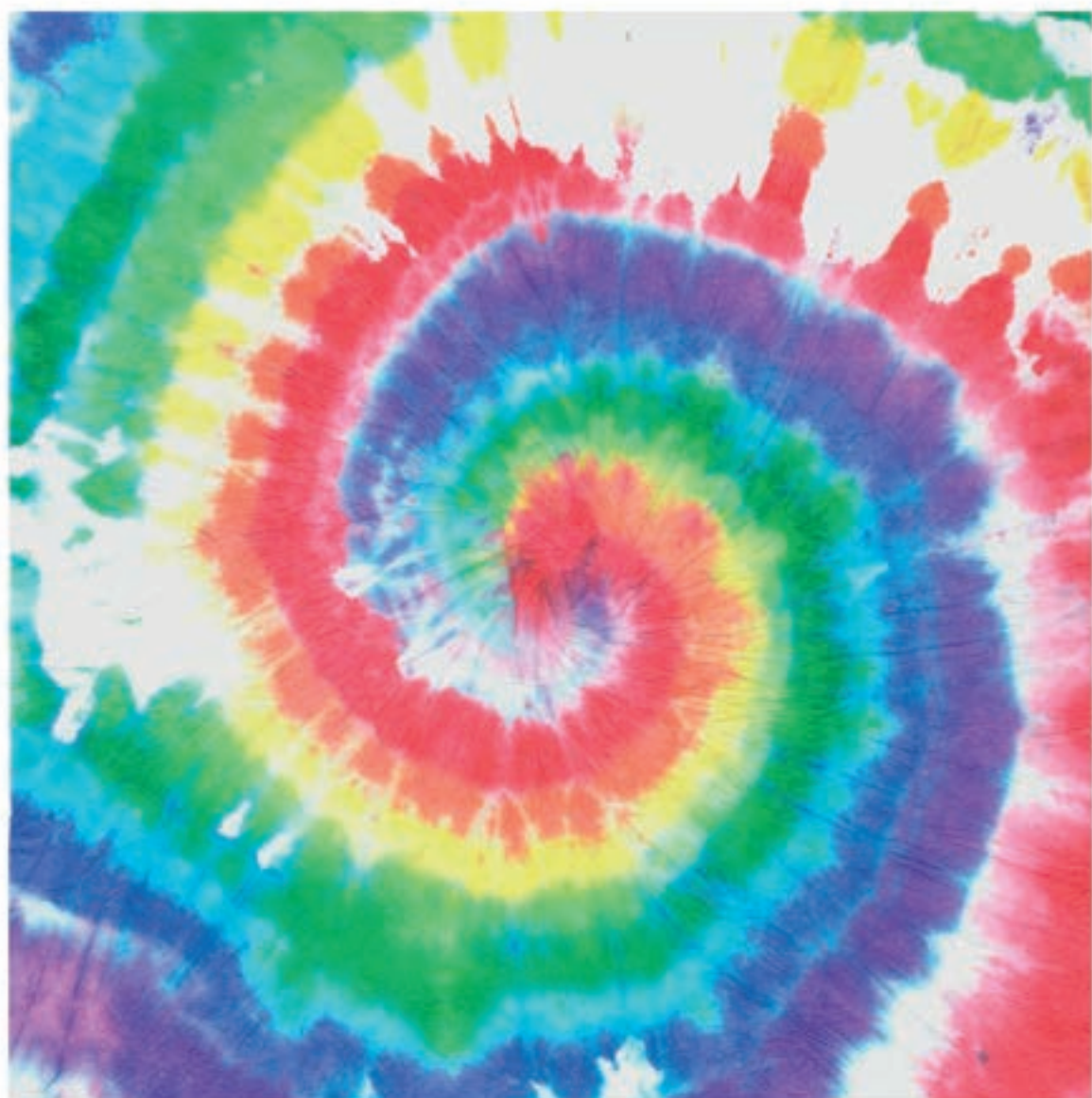
## Supplies:

- Bookmark Template
- Tape
- Scissors

1. Cut out the bookmark template. Fold your template in half and then cut it along the fold. Now you have two smaller, rectangular sheets of paper.
2. Fold one of your rectangular sheets of paper in half lengthwise. The top portion of my paper is open.
3. Now fold your paper in half again.
4. Open up your paper and you should see a fold in the middle.
5. Fold up one side of your paper against the folded line.
6. Fold the bottom left like you did with the right in step 5. Your origami corner bookmark is starting to take shape!
7. Now flip your origami corner bookmark over. Use a small piece of tape to hold both halves together.
8. Fold down the top portions to start forming the top of the heart.
9. Fold down the left corner and then the right corner on either side of the top of the heart.
10. Flip the paper over and your heart bookmark origami is complete. You can slide onto the edge of a page.







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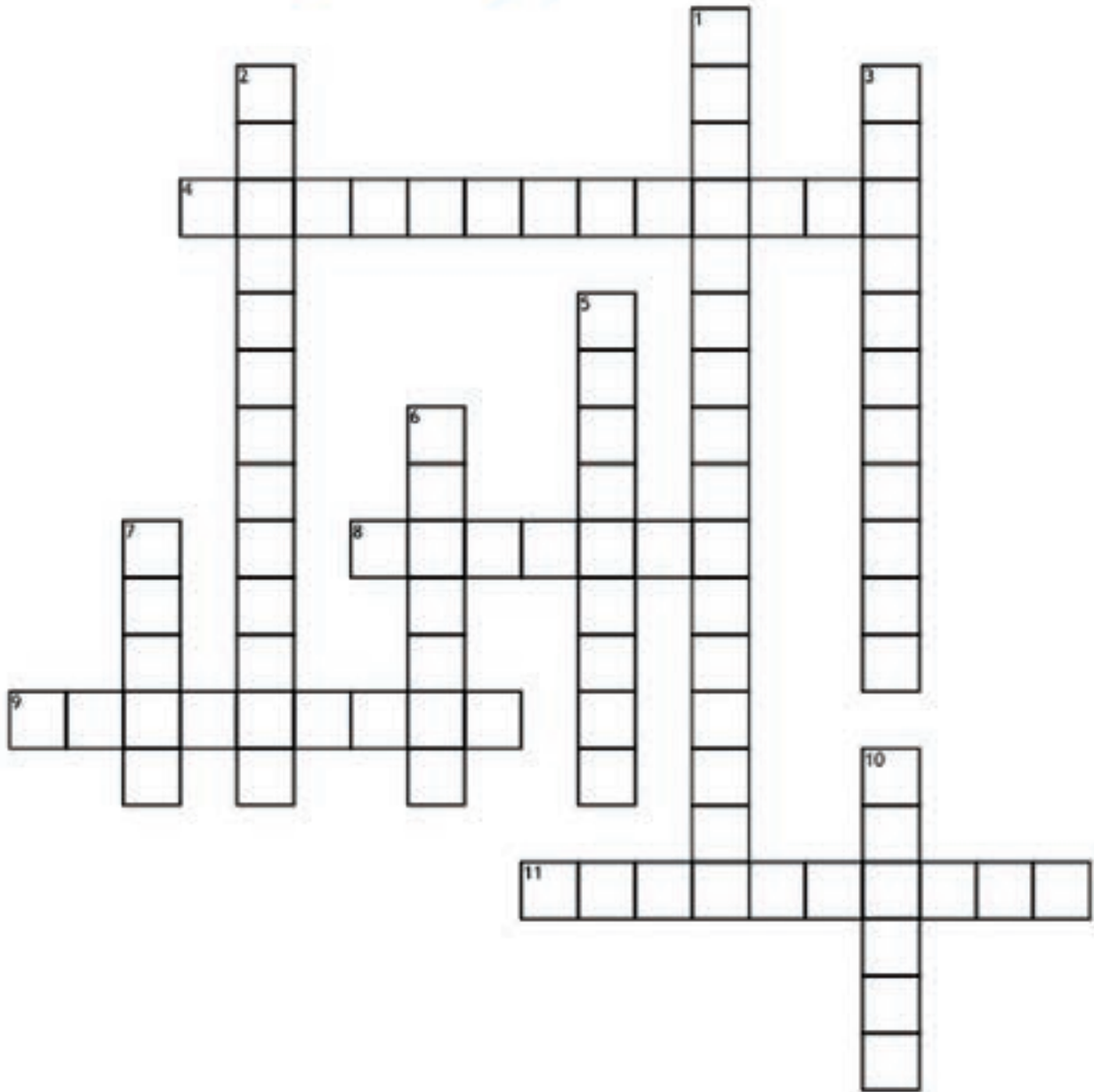


# INDOOR SCAVENGER HUNT

# SCIENCE ON A STICK

## ROCK CANDY



### What You Need:

- Sugar
- Water
- Cake Pop Sticks/Wooden Skewers
- Food Coloring

1. Dip one end of cake-pop sticks or wooden skewers in water and then roll them in granulated white sugar. The sugar should cover 2-3 inches of the stick. Let them dry completely. These are the seeds for the sugar crystal growth.
2. Boil 2 cups water and 5 cups sugar until sugar is dissolved as much as possible. It should look like syrup. This is your supersaturated sugar solution.
3. Let syrup sit until it is no longer hot and pour into glass containers. Add food coloring and stir.
4. When colored syrup is completely cool, set the sugary end of the sugar-seeded cake pops or skewers into the syrup and let them sit for about a week.
5. Gently move the sticks around occasionally, so they don't stick to the crystals in the bottom of the glass. If the glass container gets too full of crystals, pour the syrup into a new container and move your stick into the cleaner syrup to grow more crystals. When the rock candy is done, drain the excess syrup and let them dry. Enjoy!

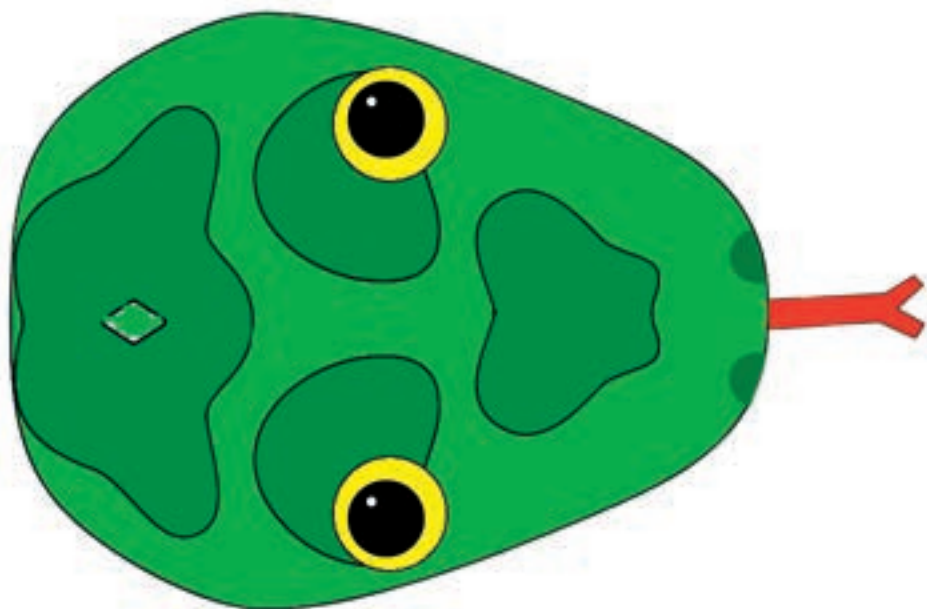


# Make a Snake!

# DIRT CAKE

## Supplies


- 3.9 ounces instant chocolate pudding mix (1 box)
- 2 cups whole milk, chilled
- 8 ounces whipped topping, thawed, such as Cool Whip
- ¼ cup unsalted butter, room temperature (½ stick)
- 8 ounces cream cheese, room temperature (1 brick)
- 1 cup powdered sugar, sifted
- 16 ounces Oreo cookies (about 40 cookies), crushed
- 24 gummy worms



## Directions:

1. Mix the instant pudding mix with the milk according to package directions. Allow to set for 5 minutes. Once set, fold in the whipped topping.
2. Using a hand or stand mixer, cream the butter and cream cheese together. Add the powdered sugar and mix until light and airy.
3. Add the pudding mixture to the cream cheese mixture. Stir well.
4. Transfer the mixture to a large Ziplock bag. Cut off one of the corners of the bag to easily fill the cups.
5. Working in layers, pipe some of the cream mixture into the bottom of each cup. Add a layer of crushed cookies. Pipe another layer of the cream mixture on top. Garnish with more cookies and gummy worms. Serve chilled and enjoy.

# GARDEN SEED BOMBS



A garden seed bomb is compost ball or paper ball that is mixed with seeds. Garden seed bombs can be placed in the garden or into a plant pot with soil. Once the seeds begin to germinate and grow the seed bomb will slowly break apart and the seeds can continue to grow.

## WHAT YOU WILL NEED

- 6 pieces Construction Paper, assort. colours
- 3-5 pkg. Flower Seeds
- Food Processor
- Scissors
- Water

## Directions:

1. Cut each piece of paper into about 1-inch squares and put them into a small dish. Keep each paper colour in its own dish.
2. Fill each dish with water just until the paper is covered. Soak the paper for about 20 minutes. Take one of the bowls of paper & wring it out about halfway. Put it in the food processor & pulse the paper into a pulp. Repeat this with all the paper colours & put the pulp back into each of their bowls.
3. Sprinkle some seeds into each bowl of paper, mix them in a little, & press the pulp & seeds into balls.
4. Set the seed balls on a sheet pan to dry overnight.
5. Plant your homemade seed bombs in your garden or anywhere you want flowers to grow! These are great for bees & butterflies!



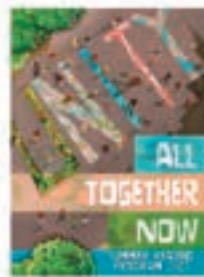


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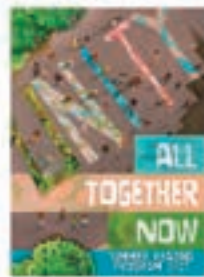


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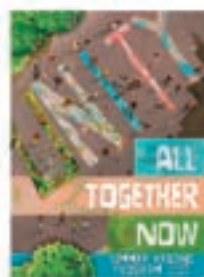


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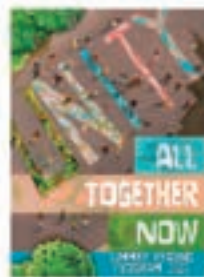
